

Key focus now:


- Trailblazer Home phase of initiative



Why should teams plan to sustain improvements?

What some studies have shown -

- It is estimated that fewer than 40 percent of health care improvement initiatives successfully transition from adoption to sustained implementation that is spread to more than one area of an organization. (Counte, M.A., Meurer, S. (2001). Issues in the assessment of continuous quality improvement implementation in health care organizations. Int J Qual Health Care 13 (3), pp. 197 207)
- In a global survey of executives of over 1900 organizations, only 26% of the respondents said the transformations they're most familiar with have been very or completely successful at both improving performance and equipping the organization to sustain improvements over time.

How do teams know they are ready for sustaining improvements?

Changes tested (PDSA cycles) in different conditions and feedback received.

Infrastructure (people, equipment, systems) exists to support project long-term

High level of performance reached during PDSA tests (run charts)

Monitoring measures and responsibility for performance measurement assigned




Results of PDSA Cycles





Champion Homes

All 10 Champion Homes involved in the initiative contributed baseline and re-survey data. Average scores were compared for each key element section in the MSSA-LTC.

This data was presented at the conference for Trailblazer Homes, held on November 3rd, 2022.







MSSA-LTC Results

Key Elements I – XI focus on general strategies for safety.

	Baseline (2021)	Resurvey (2022)	Difference
I: Resident and Family Engagement and Partnership	74.72%	89.72%	15.00%
II: Care Team	87.92%	92.71%	4.79%
III: Communication of Medication Information	92.84%	95.11%	2.27%
IV: Medication Therapy Monitoring	88.28%	93.44%	5.16%
V: Medication Labelling	89.38%	93.44%	4.06%
VI: Medication Storage and Distribution	93.65%	95.96%	2.31%
VII: Medication Administration	95.36%	97.50%	2.14%
VIII: Medication System Technology	33.44%	46.56%	13.13%
IX: Medication Devices	69.58%	90.42%	20.83%
X: Work Environment	78.13%	86.25%	8.13%
XI: Quality Improvement and Risk Management	74.34%	91.05%	16.71%





MSSA-LTC Results

Key Elements XII – XVIII focus on high-alert medications.

	Baseline (2021)	Resurvey (2022)	Difference
XII: General Strategies for Safety with High-Alert Medications	61.25%	80.00%	18.75%
XIII: Anticoagulants	76.67%	84.17%	7.50%
XIV: Insulin	80.75%	86.25%	5.50%
XV: Methotrexate for Non-Oncologic Use	60.00%	60.00%	0.00%
XVI: Opioids	83.44%	91.25%	7.81%
XVII: Oral Anti-Cancer Drugs (Chemotherapy)	70.00%	97.50%	27.50%
XVIII: Parenteral Infusions	62.08%	79.58%	17.50%





Summary



 Improvement in average scores among the 10 Champion Homes was notable in the following areas:

- Engagement with residents and families
- Use of medication devices (e.g., insulin pumps, dialysis machines)
- Use of high-alert medications such as oral chemotherapy
- Implementation of medication safety technology (e.g., ADCs)
 increased between the baseline and resurvey period, contributing
 to an increase in the average scores



 Medication Safety Technology remains the lowest scoring category, suggesting additional opportunities for improvement

Why do we want to measure?

- Are we meeting our targets for safety and quality?
- What do we do well?
- Where do we need to put more effort?
- What can we learn from our project?
- How are we doing compared to other Homes, Sectors?





Core Indicators

- 1. Number of Reported Medication Incidents and Near-misses per 100 beds per quarter
 - a. Per level of harm
 - b. Number of Medication Errors that alter a Resident's Health Status or Require Enhanced Resident Monitoring
 - c. Involving High-Alert medications
 - d. Per contributing factor category [Other, Task, Environment, Organization, Care Team, Resident, Equipment]
- 2. Number of Resident transfers to Emergency Department per 100 beds per quarter
- 3. Number of Usages of Glucagon/or Number of Cases of Severe Unresponsive Hypoglycemia per 100 beds per quarter
- 4. Resident/Essential Caregiver Engagement Survey





Optional Indicators

- 5. Number of Adverse Medication Reactions per 100 beds per quarter
- 6. Number of Usages of Rescue Medication per 100 beds per quarter
- 7. Number of Emergency Box Medication dispenses per 100 beds per quarter
- 8. Number of missing or unaccounted for controlled or targeted substances per 100 beds per quarter

Normalization

Most indicators are "normalized" to


- 100 beds
- Per quarter

This makes for more useful comparisons between homes of different sizes and provides a standardized timeframe for reporting








Transfers to ED

Number Of Emergency Department Transfers per 100 beds per quarter








Glucagon/Hypoglycemia







Background

We recognize that:

- Residents and Families are essential allies for quality, safe care
- Our project choice embodies the central tenets of Person and Family Centred Care
- ► Aligns with our core values: P.E.O.P.L.E
- Exemplifies the rights of choice, information, consent

Our Team

- ▶ DOC- facilitates and supports, fosters innovation
- ► Family representative conducts surveys, connects with other family members, advocates
- ► Registered staff- gap analysis, conducts surveys with residents, shares knowledge and practice, disseminate information, sustain practice
- Registered student- conducts surveys, participates in brainstorming

Step 1.

- ► To identify an unmet need: Assumptions that every resident and family member want to be active participants in medication decisions
- Adapted the survey to include "how important is it ...to be involved
- Survey scale: 4 pt. to include, level of importance, knowledge of action and feelings questions.
- ▶ 8-Family surveys and 12 Resident surveys completed

Vulnerabilities in Quarterly Medication Review Process

Reported Incident (details are modified to ensure confidentiality of the home and reporter)

In Ontario long-term care homes, prescribers perform quarterly medication reviews during which they authorize needed prescriptions and ensure the appropriateness of each resident's medication regimen. As part of this review, a list of each resident's current medications is typically printed on a quarterly medication review form, where the prescriber can indicate whether each medication is to be continued, discontinued, modified, or held.
